COURSE DESCRIPTION:

MGT 354. This Course emphasizes appropriate selection, formation and operation of the six basic forms of business entity organization. Particular focus is upon issues such as insurance, licensing, capitalization, valuation, distributions, redemptions, formation documentation, annual reporting, state and federal taxation, dissolution, choosing professional assistance, intellectual property, restrictive covenants, employment handbooks, employment agreements, common operating documents, and federal laws affecting entity operation. There will be a special lecture on negotiation techniques. The goal of this Instructor is to instill certain fundamental principles that will aid the student's personal, academic and business life.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- To equip each student with a comprehensive understanding of the advantages and disadvantages of the six basic entrepreneurial forms of conducting business in the United States;
- To acquaint each student with the basic formation and operation documentation to create any of the six basic forms of business;
- To provide each student basic knowledge of the issues encountered in day-to-day operation and management of a new business;
- To provide course activities enhancing critical thinking and analysis;
- To enrich and assess student oral and written communication skills through class participation projects and written assignments;
- To connect the course material to situations students will face in the creation and operation of a new business venture; and
- To increase oral and written skills from interviewing entrepreneurs.
- To acuate with entrepreneurs and learn basics knowledge from them.

- 9. <u>Interviews</u>. You and 2 other classmates find and meet with 2 Entrepreneurs at their location. You will ask questions of each Entrepreneurs to learn about their industry, their company and themselves. Ask probing questions. Students will research industry, the company and the individual, prepare summary, minimum of five single space pages, which will include summary by each student of the take away from this task, and incorporate 3 business citations regarding the entrepreneur's industry, and hand in paper and give a 10 minute presentation. All 3 students must personally be involved in the face to face interview, or all 3 students will get a grade of zero for this assignment.
- 2. <u>Business Organization Project/Presentation</u>. Each student will prepare a business project and class presentation which will involve creating an idea for a new business venture, choosing the type of ownership it will take, and preparing all appropriate documentation necessary for the formation and operation of the business venture using Michigan and federal forms that we will discuss in class before the final project submittal is due. In addition, each student will present an executive summary of the project to the class on a date assigned by the Instructor near the end of the semester. The final project submittal will be due on the date of the assigned oral presentation.
- 3. Class Conduct, Participation, and Articles. Class participation is an important part of the learning experience in this class. You can gain points by attendance, punctuality, and the quality of your articles, in-class questions, and comments. I will take attendance through the use of a seating chart, which we will establish in the second class meeting. I will take attendance in the first few minutes of class. If you arrive late and after I have taken attendance, it is your responsibility to see me at break to remove the marked absence. I take attendance again after the break. You will receive attendance points only if you are in class before and after the break. You will lose points by more than two absences (think seriously about withdrawing from this course in that event as I deduct from final grade for each class missed after two), by leaving before class ends, by being habitually late, demonstrating lack of preparation when called upon, texting or checking texts during class, talking to others when I am talking or when another student is talking, or other actions which detract from the learning environment we are trying to create together in this class. This class starts promptly at 6:30 p.m. I expect you to be on

time. By coming in late, you are disrupting me as well as your classmates. If for any reason you are not comfortable responding to a question in class, get over it quickly.

You should take notes. What I emphasize in class will surely be used in your papers and be on the exams even if not in the text or classroom presentations. Student is to copy, summarize in student's own words (minimum 200 words), attach summary to front of article, and prepare to discuss current business article. The summary is to be attached to the article and turned in at beginning of class. Maximum of 5 points will be awarded for the uniqueness and summary of the article. Keep copy of article and summary and Instructor will select 5-10 students to discuss the article at beginning of class. As this is not a group project, there is no sharing of articles. Keep copy as articles will not be returned.

4. <u>Unauthorized Collaboration</u>. - You will be called on during class to discuss certain parts of the chapter, to answer chapter problems or simply to participate. If this bothers you, get over it quickly. The Instructor's teaching philosophy is that education is best achieved when questions are asked, <u>not</u> when answers are given.
- Work environment will be simulated.
- Get involved! To maximize your business education, you must read the material before class, ask questions and participate in the class discussions. Come early, stay late. Enjoy each class and get an education that you will use the rest of your life.
