Course Description/Learning Objectives:

This course provides an examination of the theoretical and empirical issues that affect the management of individual, group and organizational processes, including structure, motivation and leadership. More specifically, this is a course that examines the science, methods, and practice of Organizational Behavior. You will be exposed to the ways in which behavioral principles are used to describe, understand, and predict how individuals and groups behave in organizations, and how this knowledge can be applied to enhance the effectiveness of the workplace. The goals of this course will be achieved through three learning objectives:

A. Building the Foundation — Students will be able to review and discuss the major content areas of the field of Organizational Behavior.

B. Research in Action — Students will be able to discuss current research articles and findings, and how they contribute to the major content areas of the field.

C. Practice — Students will be able to apply theories or principles from the major content areas of the field to address practical work situations.

Course Format:





The teaching method used in this course will be a combination of lecture and discussion. Assignments, readings, discussion forums, and other resources will be included to enhance your understanding of the material.

Course Requirements and Grading:

Final grades will be calculated based on the combination of three exams, 8 in-class discussion pieces (5 points each), a case project, and participation. Each of these components counts towards the final grade in the following percentages:

Exam 1 (Multiple Choice)	=	45 points
Exam 2 (Multiple Choice)	=	45 points
Exam 3 (Essay)	=	55 points
Case Project	=	85 points (distributed
		throughout the term)
Forums	=	40 points
Participation	=	30 points (accessing material, being prepared, meaningful class contributions)

Examinations

There will be a total of three exams. The first two exams will completely multiple choice and will each cover about half of the text book. Exam 3 will be a written/short essay exam that applies principles learned in class to real organizational issues. **Please bring a** green Scantron form and #2 Pencil to exams 1 and 2.

You must have an approved excuse documented <u>prior</u> to the exam date to miss an exam. If you miss an exam and do not have an approved excuse, you will receive a <u>ZERO</u> for that exam. It is preferred that, if you have to miss an exam, you take the exam early.

Organizational Case Project

You will write an organizational case. This is a case analysis of a real organization of which you are a member. Organizations can include work, religious organizations, sports





team and student organizations in which you ACTIVELY participate. A complete handout for this assignment is available on Moodle. <u>You must follow the format provided</u>. Deviation from the format will result in point loss. You should be thinking about picking your organization now. This project is worth a total of 90 points; subsections are due throughout the semester for partial credit. There is a penalty for late assignments (see "Other Items). All essays will be graded on grammar and spelling as well as content. Clarity of communication is an **EXCELLENT AND NECCESSARY** management skill.

Discussion Forums

At the end of every class I will pose a question or thought to you pertaining to the material covered that week. You will be responsible for applying the material or other resources in a discussion post pertaining to this questions or thought. Your post should be insightful and make connection across materials. You will also be responsible for commenting on the posts of two other classmates. For a full 5 points you must show you understand the material through the use of relevant content in your post (3 points) and make two comments that apply relevant content to the posts of others (2 points). Make sure you check the course schedule to see when forum posts are due.

Posts are due the Sunday before class by 11:59pm

Participation

Participation will be evaluated based on your level of preparedness and meaningful contributions to the class. This includes demonstrating that you have completed the readings for that week, thought about the content, and are able to discuss how what we are learning is relevant to real world organizations.

There will be MANY opportunities to participate...so use them.

Guided Readings (Extra Credit)

Every week there will be assigned readings from the textbook. To help manage your reading time as well as help you read more effectively and with purpose, each set of readings will come with a set of question. These questions are for your own benefit and will not be graded. However, students who wish to hand in their answers to these questions at the beginning of the class can earn up to a single bonus point per question set. Questions sets will be rated on a scale of 0 to 1 reflecting the effort put forth. This adds up to a potential 5% grade increase at the end of the semester.





For all work, I expect you to adhere to the University's **"Standards of Academic Integrity and Honesty"** (see the Student Handbook on the web under "Code of Academic and Student Conduct"). If you are not familiar with this, I suggest you read it. Unless specified, written work and tests in this class are individual efforts.

Additionally, I expect you to understand the concept of plagiarism. I expect proper references/citations on written assignments. The plagiarism tutorial is part of participation.

Any student who may need an accommodation because of a disability should make an appointment to see me. You should present me with your letter from Disability Support Services authorizing your needed accommodation.

All case assignments are due on the date/time specified in the syllabus unless a prior arrangement has been discussed. Late case submissions during the term will have a have a -2 points per day deduction. The deduction begins immediately after the deadline at the time indicated (for example if something is due at 5 p.m. and you submit it at 6 p.m. you lose two points). I reserve the right to not accept assignments that are late once classes end and finals start. During finals week, you post Part 4 of the case. You must post by the designated time. No late assignments on Part 4 will be accepted because of grading time constraints.
