Catalog Course Description

Provides an introduction to key microeconomic concepts. Examines operations of markets, theory of consumer demand, elasticity, organization of the firm, production and cost in the long and short runs, competition, externalities, market failures, legal and regulatory environment of business and international economics. It also explores economic perspectives on issues of ethnicity and gender in the U.S. economy. Satisfies the university general education requirement in the social science knowledge exploration area.

Prerequisite: High School Algebra

Course Objectives

Microeconomics explores the way in which individual economic agents – workers, consumers, households and firms – make decisions. The central purpose of social studies including economics is the development of citizenship, the quality of an individual's response to membership in a community. The goal of citizenship, in turn, is the constant effort through decision and action to a large degree through economic decision and economic action to foster just relations among people, institutions, and nations. The following outcomes ensure that students have the basic knowledge, skills, and values necessary for rational decision making as participating citizens - consumers, workers, and producers in a multicultural and interdependent global society. Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of basic Microeconomic terms and concepts
- 2. Develop and apply the microeconomic model of **Supply and Demand** to current events and consider the impacts, including unintended consequences, of price controls
- 3. Understand the Applications of economic concepts to topics such as externalities, antitrust, and labor markets
- 4. Describe a typical firm's set of production and cost functions, and demonstrate how corresponding graphs relate to such key economic concepts as diminishing returns and the profit-maximizing output selection under conditions of perfect competition
- 5. List and contrast the characteristics of perfectly competitive markets, Monopoly market, Oligopoly market, monopolistic competitive market, and understand the efficiency associated with such markets
- 6. Understand how to make optimal decisions in both competitive and monopolistic settings
- 7. Understand how game theory is used to do optimal decision for Oligopoly market
- 8. Apply the Supply and Demand model to labor markets to show equilibrium wage determination and how firms go about making their input selection decisions
- 9. Recognize the role of government in economic regulation, market failures, and public goods provision
- 10. Recognize how people use economics in their daily lives
- 11. Recognize the breadth of issues and problems that economic analysis helps to answer such as poverty and income inequality

However, if class average (among students who took all exams, did assignments, and came to classes) at the end of semester is below 73%, I will use class average as 2.3. For example, if final class average is 75%, I will use above table to assign your final grade. If class average is 68%, then final assigning grade will be: 68% is 2.3, 69% is 2.4, and 67% is 2.2 etc. Final GPA grade will be posted on Sail. If you have any questions regarding your final exam grade, you should contact me within 2 day of your final exam grade that posted on Moodle. Your final exam will be destroyed after the week of your Sail grade being posted.

Weekly Course Delivery and Policies

- 1. Reading and Learn Smart Assignment (Connect Plus course website): You have to read each chapter before any assignments or lecture capture in order to understand the material better. Especially if this is your first time taking economics, you must read the book and at least understand key terms before the lecture. After you read the chapter, you should do Learn Smart Study Modules in each chapter. Learn Smart is an adaptive learning tool to understand concepts and vocabulary of economics.
- **2.** Class Lectures and Lecture Capture Videos on Moodle: In the lecture part of the course, I lecture the concepts, theory, examples, etc. I am not going over every detail of the concepts or vocabulary that you can learn by reading the book and by doing Learn Smart Study Modules. However, I will more focus on problems and applications.
- **3.** In class activity (ICA) (usually in the class): These ICA questions are problems and discussions related with topics we are going to learn in each chapter. These in-class activity questions are the example questions that you might see in the problem section of the exams. This is an individual or a group setting in-class assignment in which you have a chance to solve the problems or have a discussion in class based on the video clip or news article. For each class, you should bring the copy of the ICAs that I posted on Moodle. However, if you are not following the Classroom Conduct and Rules, specified in the syllabus, you will lose ICA points for that day. No make-up ICAs and I will drop one lowest ICA.
- 4. **Homework** (**Mostly connect plus course website**): I will assign Connect homework to reinforce some of the concepts and theories in the course. Usually, I will give one week to finish homework. I will not accept any late homework **under any circumstances**. That is why I am giving one week to finish it. However, in life things do happen, so I will drop a lowest homework. (Two trials) Your homework and Learn Smart assignment can be saved so you can come back to finish it any time before the due date.
- **5. Video case, News article, logic case assignment and group discussion forum**: Those are application assignments that help you to apply the knowledge you learn through the chapters.
- **6. End of Chapter Quizzes (Connect Plus course website)**: Each end of the chapter, I will assign Connect quiz. Quiz will contain all multiple-choice questions. When you start the quiz, you must finish it within time limits. You will have only two attempts and I will pick the highest grade. Usually, online quiz will be scheduled on Friday to Sunday. The quizzes are open book and open notes, however, since you have a time constraint, you should study before the quiz. There will be no makeup quiz. However, I will drop one lowest quiz.
- **7. Exams (In the classroom)**: There are three exams. No make-up exam will be given Except Emergency. There is a '0' grade for an unauthorized absence from a test. Authorizations are given for serious events (e.g., confirmed, verifiable, and documented medical emergency, death in the immediate family). Plans for travel, doctor's appointments, or job-related responsibilities do not qualify. Should an absence be excused, the format of the make-up exam will be at the discretion of the instructor and will be scheduled within a week. Exam will contain two parts: Multiple choice part and problem part. Multiple-choice part of the questions is similar as in quiz and problem part of questions is similar with ICA and Homework questions. You will need a scantron and simple calculator for the exams.
- **8. Attendance**: Regular attendance and class participation. There will be group discussion or problem solving in the class (in-class activity) that will give you the chance to gain extra credit. If you miss the class, it is your responsibility to get notes from someone and to find out what important information was given during the class.

Classroom conduct and rules

- To help establish and maintain a courteous, distraction-free learning environment in our classroom, I ask that all students please observe the following basic rules of behavior in the class and the exam:
 - > Turn off cell phones, computers (except for special need cases), beepers, Blackberrys, Ipads, and pagers during class sessions and exam sessions. (Except when instructor allowed to use it)
