Course Description

A survey of the principal cognitive, social, and behavioral processes that operate across the life-span.

This class satisfies the General Education requirements in the Knowledge Application area.

Course Prerequisites/co-requisites: PSY 100 or 130

Course Procedures: *lectures and discussion*

Objectives

This course provides an overview and analysis of psychological research and theory from conception to death in the biological, cognitive, personality, social contexts, and relationships domains. In childhood, development usually pertains to growth or positive changes, whereas later in life, development involves both gains and losses. We will be examining the continuous development and changes that take place throughout life.

Expectations

Grade Determination

Grades in this course will be based on evaluations of the following materials:

 \Box <u>Exams</u>: Exams cover all readings, lectures, and videos. I have scheduled three exams during the semester. Exams 1 and 2 will consist of 65 multiple choice questions with each question being 1 point each (giving a maximum of 65 points each for exam 1 and exam 2). The final exam will consist of two parts – Part 1 which will consist of 50 questions worth 1 point each (totaling 50 points) and part 2 which is the comprehensive exam which will consist of 50 questions worth 1 point each (totaling to 50 points each for part 1 and part 2). Exams 1, 2, and part 1 of the final exam will evaluate your knowledge concerning the material presented immediately preceding the exam. Part 2 of the final exam is COMPREHENSIVE and will evaluate your knowledge of the entire course.

• Should you disagree with the grading of a question, I ask that you write why your answer **is correct** with direct citations from the text or lecture notes.

• If you miss class, it is your responsibility to find out what you missed and get the materials from other students. I do not e-mail my notes to students.

• **Make-up Examinations:** Make-up exams are available to those individuals who are unable to take an exam because they are incapacitated. However, make-up exams will only be given to those students <u>who provide adequate documentation</u>. That is, they must attend a funeral of a loved one, are ill to the point of needing medical attention, or have experienced a debilitating accident. Vacations are not considered valid reasons for missing exams; students who go on vacation during an exam also are taking responsibility for their choice to miss class by taking a 0.0 for that exam. Extra credit assignment will involve a 8-10 page paper based on two videos that are shown in class. The extra credit assignment will be worth 10 points. Dr. Raman will explain the details for the extra credit assignment later in the semester. The extra credit assignment will be due on **MONDAY, APRIL 9** no later than 2.30pm in class or you can leave a hard copy with Jacqui Selnes in Room 130, Pryale Hall. Assignments left in in my mailbox or under my office door will NOT be graded. I do not accept email copies of the assignment under any circumstances.

PLAGIARISM: Please note that plagiarism is not acceptable. Plagiarism is using someone else's work or ideas without giving that person credit. If you are quoting or citing someone else's work the reference must be stated, otherwise you are taking credit for someone else's ideas. You need to reference both quotations and paraphrases. Even if you rephrase, select from another person's work, or use information from the Internet, if the ideas in your paper are still the other person's and you fail to give them credit your action constitutes plagiarism of another's ideas. Those who commit plagiarism will get a '0' grade in this class will be subject to disciplinary action.
