#### PREREQUISITES and/or COREQUISITES

Prerequisites: Admissions to the School of Nursing

#### **COURSE OVERVIEW**

This course focuses on basic concepts related to professional nursing practice, including professional values and their associated behaviors. The historical, legal, and contemporary context of nursing will be discussed, including educational preparation, licensure, scope of practice, and professional codes of conduct. Ethical frameworks related to professional nursing practice and patient-centered care are explored. Intra- and inter-professional communication, as well as therapeutic communication with patients, families, and groups will be explored.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Describe professional values important to nursing.
- 2. Describe the historical, legal, and ethical foundations of professional nursing practice, including educational.
- 3. Recognize the importance of professional nursing standards and professional codes of conduct related to nursing.
- 4. Discuss the role of the professional nurse as a member of the inter-professional health care team.
- 5. Explain the impact of communication on nurse-patient, as well as intra and inter-professional relationships.

#### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

- Attendance at lecture is expected. It is the student's obligation to independently
  obtain all material missed if an absence occurs. Students are expected to prepare
  for class by reading the assigned chapters and completing any corresponding
  assignments. The purpose of the lecture is to enhance what was read and to answer
  questions related to the assigned readings and assignments.
- Attendance at all exams is <u>mandatory</u>. Any unexpected absences will be handled on an individual basis at the discretion of the course faculty.
- Completion of all course assignments. <u>Late assignments will not be accepted without faculty permission.</u>
- Students are required to receive a minimum cumulative average of 70% on combined exams (including the final exam) to successfully pass this course. In the event that students do not achieve at least a 70% combined total, they will not be eligible to receive assignment/participation and I Clicker points.
- Completion of the course with a satisfactory grade of 2.5 or above.

#### **CLASS FORMAT**

The readings listed in the REQUIRED READINGS LIST contain far more content than we can possibly address in the allotted class periods. Thus we are relying upon the readings to provide you with a breadth of material, while we will use class periods primarily to concentrate on a more detailed analysis and discussion of selected topics (i.e., depth of coverage) that are drawn from the readings. This also means that you will be reading a good deal of information that won't be covered in class, but will be considered testable for the exams. Please feel free to raise any questions you may have about material that is (or isn't) being covered in class. Your comments and questions are welcomed, encouraged and valued!

#### **EVALUATION METHODS**

The course grade will be determined based on the following:

- Exam 1 = 25%
- Exam 2 = 25%
- Assignments = 10%
- Communication Project = 10%
- Final Exam (cumulative) = 30%

#### **EXAM PROTOCOL**:

- 1. Students are not permitted to wear hats during exams.
- 2. No eating during exams.
- 3. Any student arriving > 15 minutes after the start of the exam will be required to schedule a make-up exam. The exam may be of short-answer format and make-up date to be determined at faculty's discretion.
- 4. Nothing on the desktop other than the scantron, test materials and pencil/s.
- 5. All belongings are to be placed in the front of the classroom and retrieved after the scantron and test materials have been submitted.
- 6. During exam periods, faculty reserves the right to determine seating arrangements.
- 7. Cell phone and pagers are to be turned off or silenced. <u>If a cell phone or other electronic device sounds during an examination, faculty will immediately collect the student's exam and determine an appropriate course of action.</u>
- 8. Students are responsible for monitoring their own test-taking time, so that exams are completed in the allotted time. Exam scores will be based solely on responses as recorded on the scantron.
- 9. Your signature on the exam booklet signifies your academic integrity and that no assistance has been given to another or accepted from another student during the exam. All exams are considered "secure", and therefore should never be removed from the

classroom. <u>If an examination booklet is not returned at the end of the examination period</u>, the student will receive a "0".

- 10. At faculty discretion, students will be asked to show their student picture ID card for identification purposes during the examination period.
- 11. Any student believed to be involved in academic misconduct will be reported to the office of Academic Conduct.

#### **Additional Exam Information:**

- Attendance at all course exams is mandatory.
- At faculty discretion, make-up exams will only be given in extenuating circumstances.
- The student will be required to submit documentation pertaining to their reason for absence.
- At the faculty's discretion, make-up exams may be taken on the day of the final exam and may be an essay type examination.
- Only one make-up exam is allowed per semester. After the first missed exam, a grade of "0" will be given for each exam missed thereafter.
- No other arrangements will be made for any student who misses a regularly scheduled examination.

#### **REVIEW OF EXAMS**

Review of exams will be conducted during the next class session. This will allow faculty time to review and process grades for the exam. There will be no class review for the final exam.

Students will have <u>one</u> week after the examination is reviewed to make an appointment to review the exam. Any exceptions will be arranged at the faculty's discretion.

<u>In an effort to allow faculty time to review exam materials, no questions regarding the exam will</u> be entertained until grades have been posted.

No student appointments to review any exam materials will be allowed during final exam week.

#### MOODLE COMMUNICATION

All students are expected to check the Moodle website on a regular basis for information about the course.

Technical difficulties with online assignments/quizzes will be reviewed on an individual basis. Determination for the course of action will be determined by the Faculty of Record for the

course.
