COURSE OVERVIEW

This course explores wellness and health promotion from a nursing perspective. Issues related to cultural diversity and vulnerability will be addressed. Theoretical frameworks related to wellness and health promotion across the lifespan will be described. The role of the nurse providing patient-centered wellness focused care will be discussed.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Apply concepts related to growth and development to adults and the elderly
- 2. Diversity, race, ethnicity, culture, health, and illness
- 3. Barriers to health care services
- 4. Conceptual frameworks applied to vulnerable adults
- 5. Policy, politics, ethics, and legal influences on the provision of health care to the vulnerable adult
- 6. Application of the nursing process to promote health strategies in the vulnerable adult
- 7. The role of the nurse when providing care to vulnerable populations
- 8. Future trends in health care of vulnerable adults

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Attendance at all class meetings. The student is responsible for all content presented in lecture.
- 2. Complete all evaluation measures.
- 3. Each student is expected to read assigned material prior to each class. A content outline for weekly lectures is provided.
- 4. Tape recorders will **NOT** be permitted in class.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance in class is expected and is a component of experiential learning. As such it is imperative that students maintain a perfect or near perfect record of attendance. Students are advised to attend all classes to demonstrate your professional accountability and responsibility. EVALUATION REQUIREMENTS

This course will be evaluated through a Mid-Term and Final Examination, two Self-Learning Modules Quizzes, four quizzes related to lecture content on Moodle, a community activity with an associated online journal on Moodle and ATI Online Activities.

MID-TERM AND FINAL EXAMINATIONS

Examination dates are located in the lecture outline. Students will need to bring an 8½x11 inch scantron and at least one number two pencil. To ensure a favorable testing environment all textbooks, backpacks and personal belongings will be placed on the floor in front of the testing room. It is the student's responsibility to read and follow the instructions on the test booklet. No baseball caps, hats, or beverages of any kind are permitted during the exam. After turning in the examination booklet and scantron student must leave the classroom. Students are not permitted to return to the examination room until all students have completed the exam. Students are responsible for monitoring their own test-taking time so that tests are completed during the allotted time. Students are to keep answer sheets covered. University policy regarding academic dishonesty will be enforced.

Students are expected to take the exams on the assigned date and time. A student who misses a regularly scheduled examination will **NOT** have the opportunity to make-up the examination unless there are **extenuating** circumstances and the instructor is notified **BEFORE** the scheduled exam time. Students that arrive 20 or more minutes late for an exam **WILL NOT** be able to sit for the exam and will be given 0 points for the exam grade. There will be no exceptions unless deemed appropriate by the instructor.
