COURSE OVERVIEW

Nursing Care of Adults is one of three population-focused didactic courses taught in the nursing curriculum. The focus of this course is on holistic nursing management of adult and older adult clients with complex, acute and/or chronic multi-system medical-surgical phenomena. Students will gain knowledge of complex nursing skills and therapeutic nursing interventions appropriate for acutely ill adults and older adults thereby expanding upon principles learned in the first year of the nursing curriculum. Knowledge acquisition will also focus on health promotion, disease management, and care of the dying for adult clients of differing cultural/ethnic backgrounds.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Examine the bio-psychosocial characteristics of acute episodes of illness or crises experienced by adults and older adults.
- 2. Utilize the nursing process and integrate knowledge from related sciences (e.g. pharmacology, genetics, etc.) to assess, diagnose, plan, implement, and evaluate the nursing care given to adults and older adults experiencing physiological alterations.
- 3. Apply appropriate pathophysiological concepts and principles to professional nursing care for adults and older adults experiencing physiological alterations.

COURSE OBJECTIVES (cont'd.)

- 4. Apply relevant research findings to the assessment, diagnosis, planning, implementation, and evaluation of nursing care given to adults and older adults experiencing physiological alterations.
- 5. Recognize the importance of collaborating with health care consumers and their families when planning, implementing, and evaluating culturally appropriate, patient centered, and outcome focused nursing interventions.
- 6. Recognize ethical decision making in the care of adults and older adults

TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS

All e-Learning courses at Oakland University are delivered using a learning management system called Moodle that allows instructors to design entire courses online or to enhance a classroom-based course. The Moodle software resides on a server allowing students to access it via a web browser, e.g. Mozilla, Firefox. ASSESSMENT TESTING INSTITUTE (ATI)
 Online resources will be available to students to reinforce understanding of topics discussed in Nursing Care of Adults www.atitesting.com. The use of these resources will facilitate success on written assessments taken in Nursing Care of Adults with Comorbidities (NRS 4111).

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Attendance at lecture is expected. Students will be required to purchase student transmitters (i>clicker) and the individual number assigned to that clicker will be matched to the student who owns it. The software system will be used by the faculty in order to track attendance as well as for the purpose of administering random quizzes throughout the semester.
- 2. Attendance at all exams is mandatory.
- 3. Lecture evaluation will be based on three written exams and multiple quizzes. Make up exams will only be given in extenuating circumstances. The student will be required to submit documentation pertaining to their reason for absence. Make-up exams will be taken on the day of the final exam and may be an essay type examination. Only one make up exam is allowed per semester. After the first missed exam, a grade of "0" will be given for each exam missed thereafter. No other arrangements will be made for any student who misses a regularly scheduled examination. Any missed quizzes will be given a "0", no makeup quizzes will be offered. However, the two (2) lowest quiz scores will be dropped prior to grade calculation at the end of the term.
- 4. I>clicker Technology: In NRS 3251, i>clicker questions will be used to track correct responses to posed questions. Therefore, if an incorrect response is submitted, credit will not be received. There will be no make-up for missed i>clicker questions.
- 5. Students that arrive 20 or more minutes late for an exam **WILL NOT** be able to sit for the exam and will be given 0 points for the exam grade. There will be no exceptions unless the faculty has been notified before the 20 minute deadline.

- 6. During all exam periods faculty will determine seating arrangements. Students are not permitted to wear hats or shorts, eat, and have drinks during examinations. Nothing is permitted on the desk except the examination and 2 pencils. Only calculators are permitted when indicated. All belongings are to remain on the floor in the front of the room. If a cell phone or beeper goes off during an examination, faculty will immediately collect the student's exam and determine appropriate course of action.
- 7. After turning in the examination booklet and scantron, students are <u>not</u> permitted to return to the examination room until <u>all</u> students have completed the exam. University policy regarding academic dishonesty will be enforced.
- 8. Students are responsible for monitoring their own test-taking time, so that exams are completed in the allotted time. Exam scores will be based solely on responses as recorded on the scantron.
- 9. Your signature on the exam cover signifies that you have neither given nor received assistance on the exam (cheating). All exams are considered "secure", and therefore should never be removed from the classroom. If an examination is not returned at the end of the examination period, the student will receive a "0".
- 10. Moodle will be used to communicate course activities and changes. Students are expected to check Moodle on a regular basis.

COURSE STRUCTURE

A quick look throughout the Table of Contents of your textbook will reveal to you that nursing care of adults and older adults is very detailed, specific and applicable with a diverse population. Nursing care of clients is based on your knowledge and comprehension of basic anatomy, physiology, pathophysiology, health prevention and disease promotion, and concepts from communication, physical assessment, nutrition and spirituality.

CLASS FORMAT

The readings listed in the REQUIRED READINGS LIST contain far more content than I can possibly address in the allotted class periods. Thus I am are relying upon the readings to provide you with a breadth of material, while I will use class periods primarily to concentrate on a more detailed analysis and discussion of selected topics (i.e., depth of coverage) that are drawn from the readings. Hopefully our class periods will be interesting and informative. This also means that you will be reading a good deal of information that won't be covered in class, but may be covered on the exams. Please feel free to raise any questions you may have about material that isn't (or is) being covered in class. Your comments and questions are welcomed, encouraged and valued!

• Course grades will be calculated using the specified exam weights (see above). Exam scores comprise 90% of your grade. Therefore, you need to achieve a weighted exam total for the course of **63.00 or greater** (this is equal to a 70% average for 90% of the course points). Only then, will i > clicker points (up to 10) be added to your exam total and that score will be entered into the grade conversion chart at the end of the syllabus.

• Rounding will not be used in grade calculations.

Calculation Example:

```
Exam 1 Raw score is 63 out of 90 questions = 70\% \times 0.29 = 20.3
```

Exam 2 Raw score is 65 out of 90 questions = 72% x 0.27 = 19.44

Exam 3 Raw score is 77 out of 110 questions = 70% x 0.34 = 23.8

• Please note that in the example above, the student will need to earn at least 6.46 i > clicker points to pass the course with a 70%. This is designed so that i > clicker points can help your grade **only** if you have demonstrated a minimal mastery level of the content.

• i>clicker Points

i>clicker points are calculated from the total questions offered by faculty during lectures for the semester. At the end of the semester, questions will be reviewed and i>clicker points will be applied to the scores of students that have demonstrated a minimal mastery level of course content. A maximum of 10 points will be awarded based on participation and performance of the questions.
