COURSE OVERVIEW

This course focuses on the competencies for nursing care management of childbearing families through integration of theory, rationale, and specific evidenced based nursing interventions. Didactic content emphasizes basic concepts foundational to the biophysical health care needs of women across the lifespan and the care and management of the childbearing families during all stages of human reproduction. A nursing perspective lays the foundation for exploration of issues related to wellness and health promotion, cultural diversity, spirituality, vulnerable populations, genetics, and health disparities. Content focuses on the roles of the nurse in providing safe patient-centered, evidenced based care.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Examine the biopsychosocial characteristics of episodes of related to childbearing families.
- 2. Utilize the nursing process to assess, diagnose, plan expected outcomes, implement care, and evaluate care of childbearing families.
- 3. Apply concepts of pathophysiology and scientific inquiry to plan and implement culturally competent care for childbearing families.
- 4. Integrate relevant research findings into clinical practice.
- 5. Integrate relevant research findings into clinical practice.
- 6. Collaborate with consumers, other health care professionals, and appropriate community agencies to plan and implement care for childbearing families.
- 7. Examine the role for the nurse providing health care to diverse and vulnerable populations.
- 8. Demonstrate and model personal professional accountability in all settings.
- 9. Demonstrate ethical decision-making in all settings.

TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS

ASSIGNMENTS

Short Story Analysis

For the analysis, you can assume that your audience has read the short story that you are to ANALYZE. Your assignment is NOT to summarize the story, but rather to assist other readers to appreciate the story's meaning. Ask yourself "What point is the author trying to make? and What is the message that the author is trying to relay?"

- The minimum required length for the analysis is 800 words.
- Your essay should be written using APA format
- Contain at least five (5) paragraphs, including an introduction with a clear, one-sentence thesis statement and a conclusion with restatement of the thesis. In addition, your analysis should have at least three (3) body paragraphs.

As you consider a possible thesis for your analysis, it may prove helpful to identify with several important ideas/concepts from the story that you feel that you can support from having read the short story. These ideas/concepts can be represented in your body paragraphs. Each idea/concept should be supported with ample evidence from the story.

Due date (pardon the pun[©]) for the Short Story Analysis will be March 7 before the start of class. An assignment link will be opened on our Moodle page for submission.

Journaling

As directed by course faculty, students will be required to keep a journal of self-assessment and/or self-reflection for this course.

Please use the following guidelines as you express your thoughtful self-assessments (guidelines adapted from Journaling to the Heart):

- Find a quiet, comfortable place to sit and journal for 5 -10 minutes.
- Always write with your hand and not the computer. Journaling should provide a true connection between your head, heart and hand.
- Do not edit yourself while journaling. Be honest and allow yourself to discover and express your true feelings. Spelling and grammar are not important principles to effective journaling.
- In order to receive credit for the assignment, you will need to make weekly entries. Your entries will remain confidential and will only be graded on the basis of completion.

Journal entries should be compiled in a blue book (sold at the OU Barnes and Noble bookstore). Your blue book should be submitted before the start of class on April 11.

Remember that there are no right or wrong reflections for this assignment. Be honest and open with your reflective statements. I think you will be surprised as to what can be gained from this opportunity to self-reflect.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- Attendance at lecture is expected. It is the student's obligation to independently obtain all material missed if an absence occurs. Students are expected to prepare for class by reading the assigned chapters and completing any corresponding assignments. The purpose of the lecture is to enhance what was read and to answer questions related to the assigned readings and assignments.

CLASS FORMAT

The readings listed in the REQUIRED READINGS LIST contain far more content than we can possibly address in the allotted class periods. Thus we are relying upon the readings to provide you with a breadth of material, while we will use class periods primarily to concentrate on a more detailed analysis and discussion of selected topics (i.e., depth of coverage) that are drawn from the readings. This also means that you will be reading a good deal of information that won't be covered in class, but will be considered testable for the exams. Please feel free to raise any questions you may have about material that is (or isn't) being covered in class. Your comments and questions are welcomed, encouraged and valued!

Please note All materials (slides, handouts, modules, etc) provided in this course are property of the course faculty and/or SON. EXAM PROTOCOL:

- 9. Your signature on the exam booklet signifies your academic integrity and that no assistance has been given to another or accepted from another student during the exam. All exams are considered "secure", and therefore should never be removed from the classroom. If an examination booklet is not returned at the end of the examination period, the student will

receive a "0".

- 10. At faculty discretion, students will be asked to show their student picture ID card for identification purposes during the examination period.
- 11. Any student believed to be involved in academic misconduct will be reported to the office of Academic Conduct.

Additional Exam Information:

- Attendance at all course exams is mandatory.
- At faculty discretion, make-up exams will only be given in extenuating circumstances.
- At faculty discretion, the student will be required to submit documentation pertaining to their reason for absence from a scheduled exam.
- At the faculty's discretion, make-up exams may be taken on the day of the final exam and may be an essay type examination.
- Only one make-up exam is allowed per semester. After the first missed exam, a grade of "0" will be given for each exam missed thereafter.
- Unless deemed appropriate by course faculty, no other arrangements will be made for any student who misses a regularly scheduled examination.

REVIEW OF EXAMS

After course faculty has had an opportunity to evaluate exams, exam results will be shared with the class.

Students will have one week after the examination is reviewed to make an appointment to review the exam.

In an effort to allow faculty time to review exam materials, no questions regarding the exam will be entertained until grades have been posted.

No student appointments to review any exam materials will be allowed during final exam week.
