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PREREQUISITIES and/or CO-REQUISITES

Prerequisites: Successful completion of all required nurse anesthesia courses in stepped fashion.

COURSE OVERVIEW

This course provides theoretical foundations in role theory, role development, and career planning. Advanced practice nursing issues, including the historical evolution of the roles and sub-roles, as well as current requirements for licensure and continued practice, will be examined. Students will explore their own health values and beliefs within the context of various health care systems and analyze how these values influence ethical practice and decision-making.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. Analyze the theoretical foundations of professional role development and ethics.
2. Articulate similarities and differences between the master's level roles of nurse practitioner, clinical specialist, anesthetist, midwife and educator.
3. Differentiate among sub-roles for masters prepared nurses such as clinician, consultant, collaborator, researcher, educator, and leader.

4. Analyze factors that influence professional role development of master's level nurses.
5. Examine ethical decision-making from a personal, professional, and organizational perspective.
6. Apply ethical decision-making models to the resolution of selected ethical issues in advanced nursing practice and nursing education.
