PREREQUISITES and/or CO-REQUISITES

Prerequisites: NRS 5322 (510) (NP and FN students must also have completed at least one clinical course prior to registering for NRS 6398 (687)).

COURSE OVERVIEW

The purpose of this course is to enhance professional advanced nursing practice through the development of a graduate project and dissemination of scholarly findings. Students will develop a graduate project under faculty guidance, based upon phenomenon importance to advanced nursing practice. Students will then disseminate results from the graduate project in a scholarly manner.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. Examine phenomenon of importance to advanced nursing practice and identify gaps that are amendable to change via nursing intervention.
2. Apply principles of nursing research and evidence-based practice during the development of a graduate project that addresses an identified advanced nursing practice phenomenon of importance.
3. Disseminate graduate project findings in a scholarly manner.

ESSENTIAL CONTENT

- Advanced nursing practice issues/phenomena of interest
- Research process
- Evidence-based practice
- Scholarly dissemination of findings

COURSE ORGANIZATION

This course is organized in modules and is designed using theory and principles related to adult, self-directed learning and accountability. Course readings, assignments and activities are designed to support the course objectives and concepts. Online PPT presentations, case studies, web exploration and other activities may be used to explain and apply course content and evaluate student assignments. A variety of evaluation methods are used.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS, EXPECTATIONS & GUIDELINES

Moodle: Moodle will be used for this course; announcements, videos, presentations, handouts, and more will be posted on Moodle. Moodle must be used to submit all assignments. See Section on Technology for specific Moodle information.

Computer Access: Since computer access is available worldwide, it is expected that students will be able to access the course site throughout the semester. If for some reason a student is unavailable/unable to access the internet for a period of time, the student must let the faculty know in advance. While absences from discussions or presentations will not be approved, there may be an allowance offered for delayed, early entries or alternative assignments for substantive reasons or events but only if faculty is notified prior to the delay.

Course Participation/Engagement: Since this is an online course, students are expected to keep up with periodic postings which may include: PPT presentations, videos, discussion forums, guest speakers, WebEx sessions, and readings on a regular basis. Faculty will monitor students continued progression and online activity for all of the course activities.

WebEx Sessions/Guest Speakers: These sessions will be scheduled periodically throughout the semester to provide opportunities for course orientation, faculty-student interaction, information-sharing, updates, guest speakers on culturally relevant topics, and student presentations. Everyone is encouraged to attend these sessions which will be recorded.

Required readings: It is expected that students will be self-directed in seeking new information, and complete readings/assignments in accordance with the course outline. Readings and assignments are to be done in advance of online sessions to give adequate time for assimilation and reflection. Students should come to meetings with faculty/online discussion sessions prepared to discuss and raise questions about the project focus area. Required readings

may be supplemented by student and/or faculty selection of current refereed journals as the needs and interests of the student are identified.

Assignments & Formatting: All assignments required in this course must be successfully completed to receive a passing grade. See Evaluation table. Module assignments with instructions can be viewed on Moodle. To receive full credit students are expected to demonstrate analysis and synthesis of the course concepts in their assignments and provide rationale from readings and/or additional sources to support their statements. Feedback and grading will be submitted via Moodle. The American Psychological Association 6th edition (2009) format will be expected for all text and reference citations of sources.

Course Grades & Faculty Availability: The turn-around time for feedback and grades is approximately two-three weeks after the due date of all assignments. Late Assignments will only be accepted at the discretion of faculty. If accepted, five points will be taken off the grade for the late assignments. You are required to notify faculty in advance to discuss whether a late assignment will be accepted.

Faculty will be available to students via email & in-person meetings as needed and arranged. Emails to faculty must be sent to jmfoulad@oakland.edu with the Subject heading listed as “NRS6398 Inquiry”. If you do not receive a response within 4 business days, please resend your email.

Rules of Netiquette: These rules for online interactions with faculty and/or other students will be observed at all times. This course requires an open exchange of ideas. At no time will it be acceptable to use nonprofessional or inflammatory language on the course site. Any such entries will be deleted. Remember email and discussion lack inflection and expression that real conversation communicates so take care to prevent inadvertent misunderstandings. Participation/Engagement: Students must demonstrate involvement in activities to attain course objectives. This may include faculty-student meetings to discuss progress, written reports on course activities and involvement with faculty-led research projects.

Discussion Forums:

- Discussion questions will be posted by faculty every month.
- Students must post a response to each question, and also respond to other student posts if applicable.
- Posts must be scholarly, that is, each must include serious dialogue reflecting course readings as well as outside literature obtained by the student.
- References should be included to support your ideas and to receive maximum points.
- Posts are graded in a pass/fail manner. Students who consistently maintain regular dialogue as described above demonstrating knowledge of the assigned and outside readings with citations will receive full credit.

Guidelines & Evaluation Criteria for specific contracted course assignments will be available on Module.

Scholarly Activities: These will be contracted between the student and faculty. And may vary depending on student need and interest. Activities will manifest achievement of research skills and actual/potential application to clinical practice.

TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS

All e-Learning courses at Oakland University are delivered using a learning management system called Moodle that allows instructors to design entire courses online or to enhance a classroom based course. The Moodle software resides on a server allowing students to access it via a web browser, e.g. Mozilla, Firefox.
