#### PREREQUISITS and/or CO-REQUISITES

Co-requisites: NRS 206 (2111), NRS 207 (2123), NRS 208 (2131), NRS 209 (2133), NRS 213 (2165), and NRS 252 (2181)

#### **COURSE OVERVIEW**

This course explores the concepts of health, wellness, and health promotion from a nursing perspective for the developmental stages of prenatal through adolescence. Specific areas of discussion will include cultural diversity, vulnerable populations, and the role of the professional nurse in the health promotion/disease prevention.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Examine growth and development principles applicable to the prenatal through adolescent periods.
- 2. Discuss health and health promotion from a nursing perspective as they relate to prenatal through adolescent clients and their families.
- 3. Discuss issues related to culture and vulnerability from a nursing perspective as they relate to prenatal though adolescent clients and their families.
- 4. Recognize the impact of cultural diversity and vulnerability related to health behavior and the role of the professional nurse.
- 5. Discuss the role of the professional nurse related to providing health promoting and/or disease prevention education to prenatal through adolescent clients and their families.

#### TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS

#### **COURSE FORMAT**

#### **EXAMINATION GUIDELINES**
