# **COURSE OVERVIEW**

This course focuses on the professional nurse's role in the community. Professional nursing practice with groups, families, communities, and population will be examined. A variety of settings where nursing care in the community is provided across the lifespan will be examined (e.g., public/community health nursing, home care, hospice, disaster/emergency preparedness, etc.) Legal ethical, and regulatory processes that influence the delivery of health care in the community will also be discussed.

# **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

- 1. Discuss the differences between community nursing and public health nursing.
- 2. Examine the professional nursing roles essential to community nursing, including leader and advocate, in order to improve the equity, accessibility, and affordability of patient-centered care, and to ensure social justice to help eliminate health disparities.
- 3. Assess the health/illness beliefs, values, attitudes, behaviors, risk factors, resources, and environmental exposures of group, families, communities, populations, and individuals in the community as the basis for outcome-focused care.
- 4. Identify community-based resources and reimbursement sources for issue related to community nursing.
- 5. Incorporate evidenced-based interventions in the plans of care developed for groups, families, communities, populations, and individuals in the community and strategies for evaluating their effectiveness.

# **ESSENTIAL CONTENT**

- Differences between community nursing and public health nursing.
- Role of professional nursing in establishing collaborative partnerships with groups, families, Populations, and individuals in the community in order to provide outcome-focused care.
- Settings of care for community nursing.

• Community resources and reimbursement issues related to community nursing.

#### **Class Participation: 15%**

Students in previous years have supported a short in-class weekly review or quiz each week on materials covered the previous week. This has helped students to reinforce concepts and stay current with the material. Using iClickers2, your score will be recorded each week. Since you are learning new material and the point is to learn from your mistakes, your lowest score on the quiz (or you missed class because of illness) will be eliminated to calculate your points for this learning activity. If your average score is 80% or better, you will receive 15 points; if 70% or better you will receive 12 points; if less than 70% you will receive 9 points. You will be allowed to use one side of one 8½ 2 x 11-inch paper to serve as a cheat sheet (or memory aid) if you wish.

In lieu of the weekly review, short in-class assignments/activities may be required and turned in for participation points.

Please note: there will not be a weekly review on the dates there is an exam scheduled.

#### Exams (3): 15% each= 45% of total grade

There will be three in-class exams scheduled for this course. Each exam will primarily be NCLEX-RN style with the potential for the following types of questions: true-false, matching, multiple choice, short-answer, and short essay. Prior to each exam, all students will be provided

with a test blueprint. The test blueprint will provide guidance as to what to expect on each test including: a list of the major topics included on the test, the level of complexity of the test question, and the number or percentage of questions in each category. Students will be allowed to use one side of one  $8\frac{1}{2} \ge 11$ -inch paper to serve as a cheat sheet (or memory aid) if they wish. This cheat sheet will be turned in with the exam. During testing, no personal belongings may be brought into the testing classroom other than a pencil or pen. Absence from an exam must be pre-approved.

#### Public Service Announcement Project: 20%

In groups of approximately four students, you will create a video recorded Public Service Announcement.

#### Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI) Assessment: 0%

ATI examinations are proctored **assessments** to help students identify nursing content they know and nursing content in need of further study. The assessments provide printable evaluations that can be used to assist in developing a focused review. These focused reviews should be used as a guide for passing the Comprehensive Predictor and NCLEX. Achieving an ATI proficiency level of a 2 on an assessment is indicative that a student will meet the NCLEX-RN standards. Those students who achieve a level 3 are more likely to exceed the NCLEX-RN standards. Students who achieve a level 1 or below are less likely to meet the NCLEX-RN standards. You must complete the RN Community Health ATI Assessment (60 minutes) as part of the course requirements. These tests will be offered as a proctored paper and pencil exam.

#### Windshield Survey: 10%

The purpose of this assignment is for you to conduct a windshield and/or walking survey of a community neighborhood where you live or work.
