# Grading

#### Midterm Exam

The mid-term examination will comprise multiple-choice questions and an essay. More details will be discussed in class.

#### Final Exam

Students will write a final exam that includes both a take-home essay in addition to multiple-choice and short answer questions. More information will be distributed after the midterm.

Students will complete a series of short assignments – essay prompts, creative projects, annotation assignments – responding to the films screened in class and posted to the course Moodle site.

#### Attendance and Participation

Students will be evaluated on their active and informed participation in class discussions. Note that as attendance is a prerequisite of such participation, attendance will be taken in lecture and in screening. You are allowed three absences (excused or unexcused) during the course of the term; additional absences beyond this will reduce your course grade by one-third of a grade point (i.e. from B+ to B; see conversion chart below).
