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Course Description: Introduction to literary analysis and appreciation through readings in the British literary tradition, including the Beowulf poet, Shakespeare, Wordsworth, Keats, Dickens, Tennyson, WWI Poets, Lawrence, Conrad, Woolf and Carter.

Course Prerequisites/Co-requisites – none.

This class satisfies the General Education requirements in Literature

General Education Learning Outcomes:

The student will demonstrate:

- **knowledge of how literature is an expression of culture** we will do this by placing literary texts in the context of historical periods and cultural attitudes to class, gender and race, and by considering how individual texts reflect developments and conflicts in British and/or European history and social history.
- knowledge of literary form we will do this by considering differences of genre (prose and poetry; fiction and non-fiction) and by developing attentiveness to other aspects of literary artistry such as point-of-view, tone, and style.

Cross-cutting Capacity: critical thinking

Other Course Objectives:

- Breadth and a sense of literary history: English 241 gives students a breadth of reading in British literature from the Old English Period (c.750) to the early twentieth century (1920's), and helps students "place" literature in relation to its literary predecessors and successors
- Introduction to literary genres: introduces students to a variety of genres, such as poetry, the novel, short fiction, drama, and film, and helps students learn about the distinguishing characteristics of literary genres and forms.
- Development of critical thinking, reading and writing skills

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Textbooks: Students are required to buy the textbooks in the editions listed above so that they may easily locate passages discussed in class. Students also must bring assigned hard copy texts to class. **Check for your texts before you leave home for class and after you park your car!**

Class participation: Class discussion, group work, forum posts: (15% of course grade): Students learn more when they share ideas and discuss specific parts of a text. Participation grade is based on oral comments and questions, group work, and required forum posts. Quality is valued over quantity.

Homework & Quizzes: (35% of course grade): Quizzes always cover the material assigned FOR THAT DAY. Quizzes may be short answer, short essay or passage identification, and normally take 10-15 minutes to complete. No makeup quizzes will be given, but the lowest quiz/homework grade will be automatically dropped. Quizzes are usually based on that day's assigned reading and study guide questions. Quizzes measure how well and carefully students are reading their assignments, as well as critical thinking skills.

Examinations: (Midterm (25%) and Final (25%)= total of 50%): There will be 2 exams. Exams will employ a format of term I.D. (literary terms, period concepts, characters or significant settings); quoted passage I.D.'s; and essay. No makeup exams will be given, except in cases of demonstrated emergency such as hospitalization, etc. You must contact professor <u>prior to the exam</u> if such an emergency arises.

Attendance: More than 5 absences will lower your final course grade, .3 for every absence beyond 5 absences. Being present for class means being on time and staying until the end.

COURTESY IN CLASS: Most students exercise basic courtesy in listening attentively to the comments of other students and to the professor. Rarely, there are students who disrupt class by talking to each other

while a classmate or while the professor or teaching assistant is addressing the class. Disruptive students may be asked to leave and counted absent for that class. More than two warnings will negatively affect the student's class participation grade.

Electronic Devices: Please put your cell phones on vibrate in class so your phone does not ring during class. If you have an emergency please exit the classroom to receive or make a call. Texting or using your phone during class, including film showings, will negatively affect your participation grade. The use of laptops is not allowed. Studies show that writing down notes by hand helps students learn better and retain more than when notes are typed into a computer.

Academic Conduct Policy: Cheating on exams is considered a serious breach of academic conduct and will result in disciplinary action by the University Senate's Academic Conduct Committee. The Oakland University policy on academic conduct will be strictly followed with no exceptions. See catalog under Academic policies and procedures. NOTE: cheating on homework by copying internet sites is a violation of academic conduct standards. Do your own work.

Adds/Drops: The University add/drop policy will be explicitly followed. It is the student's responsibility to be aware of the University's deadline dates for dropping the course, and to check with the professor if the student would like further information about his/her progress in the course.
